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
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The Black Leadership Council, First 5 Alameda County & Partners Host “Aftershock” Film Screening & Panel Discussion

SAN FRANCISCO (April 3, 2023) – [PRC](http://www.prcsf.org), the San Francisco nonprofit that offers comprehensive and relevant services for individuals living with HIV/AIDS, substance use disorder or mental illness, today announced the film screening of *Aftershock* and post panel discussion on **April 12 at 3pm** at Grand Lake Theatre in Oakland, CA.

In recognition of Black Maternal Health Week (April 11-17), an effort to build awareness, activism, and community-building to amplify the voices, perspectives and lived experiences of Black Moms and birthing people, the **Black Leadership Council (BLC)**, an initiative of PRC, along with, **First 5 Alameda County, Alameda Health System, Alameda County Public Health Department's BElovedBIRTH Black Centering**, and the **California Black Health Network**, will screen the film *Aftershock* - a thoughtful and powerful example of the impact that maternal mortality has on our community and Black families.



Throughout the film, we witness two families become ardent activists in the maternal health space, seeking justice through legislation, medical accountability, community, and the power of art. Their work introduces us to a myriad of people including a growing brotherhood of surviving Black fathers, along with the work of midwives and physicians on the ground fighting for institutional reform. Through their collective journeys, we find ourselves on the front lines of the growing birth justice movement that is demanding systemic change within our medical systems and government.

Moderated by Tasha Henneman, Director of the Black Leadership Council and PRC's Chief of Policy and Government Affairs, and Kevin Bremond, Founder and program administrator of the Fathers Corps initiative at First 5 Alameda County, this event assures to be filled with emotion and activism.

“I had the privilege to watch *Aftershock* at the African-American film festival in Martha’s Vineyard last summer, and I was activated,” stated **Tasha Henneman**. “After the screening I immediately approached Tonya Lewis Lee and insisted that we show this film in California, especially since our State Senator Nancy Skinner had recently authored the [California Mornibus Act](#),” legislation that follows the footsteps of the federal Black Maternal Mornibus Act of 2021 and includes several strategies to reduce pregnancy and postpartum death rates and infant mortality, especially for families of color.



“We cannot sit idle while our Black community continues to lose their lives due to preventable health care measures,” said **Domonique Wilson**, parent partnership administrator, First 5 Alameda County. “We’re committed to bridging services and policies to support children and families from 0-5 years to combat racism-based birth disparities, as demonstrated through our programs at First 5 Alameda County.”

"I am thrilled to be part of such an impactful event that not only brings attention to issues of Black maternal health, but also highlights the fathers, who are critical partners," said **Kevin Bremond**, founder and program administrator of the Father’s Corps multi-sector initiative at First 5 Alameda County. “Father’s experiences, feelings and overall visibility are often not prioritized, but this film does an amazing job to acknowledge their role and importance.”
